Olympea Games: Celebrating Sport through peas

Peasenhall Pea Festival: 15th July 2012, 11am-4pm. Peasenhall Village Hall.



The 5th annual Peasenhall Pea Festival is back and celebrating the local pea legacy passed down from Anglo Saxon times. This year we are getting into the spirit of the Olympics and have arranged our own Olympea Games as a warm up to the other event being launched in London later in the month. Our event takes place on 15th July in Peasenhall, Suffolk.

We plan to take our rich pea history to new and challenging levels, harnessing the power and finely honed pea skills developed through many generations by the local people of Peasenhall and surrounding villages.

This year the Festival pea theme is pea sports along with some very special pea dancing: we believe this to be a first in the world. Our Pea sports events include:

- National pea eating championship
- ♣ Flick a pea, puff a pea, pot a pea
- ♣ 10 pea bowling
- The world pea podding championship
- The British pea throwing championship
- Pea Shooting
- ♣ Aim your pea (into a toilet)
- ♣ Pea eating with cocktail sticks

The well known Mystic Pea Belly Dancers will be performing some exquisite pea belly dancing, and teaching those attending the festival the rudiments of this ancient art. We are also aiming to have the largest number of pea belly dancers ever seen performing at any one time in the world.





Another challenge we have set ourselves is to attempt a world record of achieving the longest belly dance ever while holding a pea in the belly button.

Kelsale's Moment

1.15pm, July 5th 2012, the Olympic Torch will be coming through Kelsale, a day to remember! The torch will travel from Rosemary Lane through to Saxmundham offering plenty of room for spectators along the way.

Yoxford Morris Dancers, Barley Brigg, will be performing before the relay, at 12.45, in West View and afterwards at Kelsale Village School.

A field for parking will be available along Rosemary Lane. From Main Rd, it is on the left, before the Poachers' Pocket and will be signed on the day. Please allow plenty of time, park in the field and walk up, as our lanes are not wide enough for parked cars. Please also consider car sharing to reduce traffic. For disabled drivers we will reserve some spaces in the village centre car park.

If you would like to be part of the Olympic spirit we would welcome volunteers to help direct people to parking areas, toilets, etc before the Torch Relay. You would be needed from 12pm-2pm on the day and for a quick briefing sessions the day before. Please do get in touch with Jeni Aird on 01728 602656 and become part of something very special.

Saxmundham's Moment

Over 1000 school children are planning to come to town to witness this uplifting moment, so there should be a real buzz in town. The town is being decorated with Olympic Flags bearing the famous five rings, the wonderful bunting from the Jubilee will remain in place and Framlingham

College Jazz band will play on the Market Hall Forecourt.

The Olympic Torch is Coming To Town! - 5th July 2012

The torch will be carried by 3 bearers through the town, surrounded by a convoy of sixteen vehicles, and some running metropolitan police officers for their safety!

It will be born by runners from somewhere near the Saxmundham sports and social club, up to the traffic lights, where it will return to Convoy Mode (back on the coach).

It is then believed to be travelling by Coach along the B1121 to Bigsby's Corner, where it will go through Sternfield and Friston before arriving at Aldeburgh at 1.39 (timing taken from www.london2012.com/torchrelay/route/ which offers slightly different times to local organisers'

Glynn Moye, who has headed up the organisation of the event in Saxmundham has received two official Olympic lapel pins. One of these will be buried in a time capsule by Ipswich Building Society, which will be 'exhumed' in 10 years' time. The other will be donated to the Saxmundham museum, leaving a small but perfectly formed material memory in the town. comments, 'Lots of organisations and the Town Council have got fully behind the Torch coming through the town and have pulled together to make sure that this is a wonderful, memorable and uplifting occasion. We look forward to welcoming you.'

He advises people to plan ahead and arrive early as there will be no extra parking facilities in the town on that day. The main car parks are at Waitrose, Tescos and on Market Hill.

The Time Team Visit Dunwich



IN JUNE 2011 the Time Team came to Dunwich to try and solve some of the queries about two unique sites: the

Hospital of the Holy Trinity, buried under the village car park, and the precise location of the church in the ancient Friary – long since demolished during the Dissolution of the 1530s.

In addition, they wanted to date the Town Ditch or "Pales Dyke" more accurately; convinced that the ditch was Saxon in origin, not Norman as had been previously believed. But things didn't turn out quite as expected ...

This season the Dunwich Museum is running a fascinating exhibition of the story and the some of the fascinating objects found during the Time Team dig. From Wednesday 25th July from 2:00 to 4:30 pm, and same time every Wednesday throughout the summer holidays, the Museum will be running drop in sessions to explore our handling collection, with an expert on hand to tell you all about it. The event, held for the Village by the Village was a huge success raising in excess of £1800, which will be spent on improvement to village facilities and organisations.

Sizewell Sponsorship Supports CAB Service

AN ESSENTIAL advice service at the Citizens Advice Bureau will continue – thanks to sponsorship support from EDF Energy's Sizewell B power station.

One of the key services offered by the Leiston, Saxmundham and District Citizens Advice Bureau (CAB) from its base in Colonial House, Leiston, is the support of a Money Advisor.

"We offer free, independent, confidential and impartial advice to local people across a range of subjects" said CAB manager, Nick Mayo.

"As you can imagine, there are a lot of people in this area with money troubles, particularly debt problems. Sometimes the situation is made worse if people have learning difficulties, as this may make it harder for them to learn to deal with money issues.

"We use a specialist Money Advisor to help them by showing them how to deal with money issues, providing a long-term solution by teaching them to be self-sufficient."

This worthwhile service has been inundated with requests for help and the current economic climate is likely to make the CAB even busier.

"What we are also seeing now, which is new, is a growth in the number of people who are home owners but have lost their job or are on reduced hours and need advice on how to survive on a reduced income," said Nick. "We can help, but we need people to come and see us sooner rather than later, before they get into


serious difficulty."

Unfortunately, the Citizens Advice Bureau had run short of funds to run this important service, so approached Sizewell B power station for support.

"Although we have a limited budget for sponsorship within the community, this is such a worthwhile service that we did not hesitate to provide the £1,000 needed to help keep it going," said Sizewell B's community liaison officer, Niki Spatchett.

"We take pride in our community links, as well as the jobs we provide in the area, but we are also mindful of the need to support essential services like this, which help people cope in these difficult times."

Responding to the decision to provide the sponsorship, Nick said: "This is fantastic news, as it allows us to keep this advice giving process going. It is a good example of our ability to work with Sizewell B to provide benefits across the entire community."

"Saxmundham Free School will open with years 7, 8 and 9 and will grow by a year group a year, until 2014 when all year groups will be in place. The gradual build up is a result of the local school reorganisation that will see the closure of middle schools and children spending longer at their primaries.

Scam warning - Halesworth and countywide

Police are again warning residents to be alert for scam telephone calls after a woman in Halesworth received a call from a person purporting to be from Ministry of Justice saying that in return for a £99 Ukash voucher she would receive a cheque for more than £3,000.

The caller contacted the woman on Friday 8 June, made reference to overpaid bank charges and said that once the resident had obtained the voucher she should forward it to a company and would then receive a cheque via a courier.

The woman contacted police before purchasing the voucher after becoming suspicious.

Police are urging residents to be alert for a number of telephone scams, such as this, in which callers try to get you to hand over cash with the promise of a larger sum to follow when they have received it.

In similar incidents callers have claimed to work for a range of organisations including the Ministry of Justice and London County Court among others.

In some cases the callers know basic information such as the name and address of the person they are calling and use this information to encourage people to get Ukash vouchers which either need to be sent or will be collected in return for thousands of pounds to follow at a later date. Officers are reminding residents NEVER to respond to anything which demands you hand over cash before reclaiming funds.

Genuine refunds will automatically delivered without you having to pay anything and you should never respond to demands for money to be sent in this way.

Similar scams are often used with the promise of a prize or reward in the future and many people have been duped into sending off hundreds or thousands of pounds before they realise it is just a ploy to con you out

Please be extremely cautious when dealing with any unknown callers never respond to requests for money and never give out personal orbank details or PIN numbers over the phone.

LEISTON TOWN COUNCIL

Highlights of Leiston-cum-Sizewell Town Council meeting held on 12 June 2012

Present: Cllr. T. E. Hodgson (chair), Cllr. D. E. Bailey, Cllr. R. Bailey, Cllr. D.R. Boast, Cllr. R. J. Geater, Cllr. C. S. Ginger, Cllr. T. J. Hawkins, Cllr. W.H. Howard, Cllr. J. N. Last, Cllr. Mrs A.V. Nunn, Cllr. A. J. Nunn Apologies: Cllr Parker, Cllr Cooper, Cllr Mrs Geater, and Cllr Sparrow.

Neighbourhood Plan: Cllr Howard, Cllr. Bailey, Cllr Geater, Cllr Boast and Cllr Ginger agreed as the initial membership of a steering group to organise the project, to be joined by representatives of the town. Members agreed to use parish boundary to define the area.

Upper Abbey Farm: EDF estates team are creating working on the renovation of the Farm which they hoped to have in place by the end of June, with a planning application was timetabled for September. Housing Provision scrutiny SCDC: Noted the request from SCDC to provide feedback to their Scrutiny Committee with regard to housing provision. Agreed to put forward statement prepared by Cllr. Howard as a basis for their concerns:-

"Buying a house is out of the question for many people and we are looking at housing at a time when there is a growing need for reasonably priced rented accommodation. Reasonable, to me, means that rents should be affordable to families whose main wage earner is on the National Minimum Wage of £243 a week, from this tax and national insurance is deducted. If you are unemployed the income is £71 for a single person and £111 for a couple. In the private sector rents locally are in the region of £585 a month for a 3 bed property and housing association rents are set to catch up. At the same time government is planning to reduce security of tenure and has already set in place limits on housing benefit. The need for more single accommodation desperately needs attention. At times I know there are no hostel places in the whole of East Suffolk. At a recent housing seminar run by SCDC we were told that housing lists in this area are growing. It is alarming that housing developers make land available but there isn't the money to build. Personally, I think that the roots of good society are good houses, well maintained, at rents people can afford and with a security of tenure.

Sizewell Parish Liaison Group: Agreed £150 be paid to SPLG for this year's membership.

Library: The IPS (Industrial and Provident Society) will take full control of all Suffolk libraries on 1st August and then be in a position to advise the groups and parishes on the best way to set themselves up to take an interest in their library.

Mr Taylor: Members noted Mr Taylor's previous correspondence re. the Dry Fuel Store and the AAF and his concerns regarding how the 106 process might and who should manage the monies. Clerk to request a visit from the SCDC 106 officer at next meeting to clarify the process.

Finance

a) Accounts for Payment: £21,726.10p along with £7,701.23p paid since the last meeting be approved for payment.

b) Approval of accounts for 2011/2012: Members agreed that the accounts for 2011/2012 and the Accounting Statement on the Annual Return be approved.

c) Chairman and Members Allowance: At year end Chair was often out of pocket (although uncomplainingly) and members felt this should be rectified and a sufficient sum be provided. It was agreed to increase the Chairman's allowance to £1,000.

Planning Matters

C12/0980 – Erection of extensions to existing buildings to form visitor centre for Sizewell B Power Station, Leiston. Members content with planning matters relevant to application but concerned that access to the centre would appear to be by application/invitation. It was hoped that this Visitor centre could be an attraction for visitors and residents without preapplication. Recommend Approval

C12/- New Library Room Extension, together with internal alteration to adjacent building area and associated external landscaping at Leiston Primary School. Recommend approval

C12/1012 – Use of part of the garden to 18 Buller Road, Leiston for erection of a new dwelling house (re-submission). Members were all agreed that plot was unsuitable for a 3 bed house. It would upset the historic street scene and destroyed the amenity of number 18 Buller Rd due to proximity and high block walls. The site of proposed dwelling has had a garage on for the use of number 18 for over 30 years. The development would remove this off-street parking with no substitute on street parking in the immediate area. The small area allocated

on the plans was considered unworkable. Parking issues, cramped footprint and the affect on the neighbouring properties' amenity is significant and unacceptable. Recommend Refusal.

C12/1122 – Proposed conversion of the former Coast guard lookout into holiday accommodation and ancillary artist's studio – Coastguard Lookout, Sizewell, Leiston. With parking limited to one car, no outside furniture or development and all the important internal original features retained members approved. Recommend Approval

C12/1190 – Proposed new bungalow in part rear garden, 1 Garrett Crescent, Leiston. Overdevelopment affecting amenity of neighbouring properties and be an eyesore, out of keeping with the historic setting. Recommend Refusal

County Matters

Flooding: Cllr Howard reported a flooding problem on the bend at the top of Southfield Drive for the Clerk to report.

Potholes: A nasty one was reported on the footway along the southern edge of Westward Ho by the first car parking area. **Correspondence**
